In recent decades, ageing has become one of the world's most pressing issues, especially in highly developed countries like Japan and the UK. In addition, the pressures of globalization and migration are making ageing an increasingly intercultural process. Those who cross social and cultural borders eventually grow old and experience a series of losses in physical strength, social utility or family relationships in an intercultural context. In a multicultural society like the UK, many elderly people from ethnic minority groups find themselves in a 'double jeopardy,' suffering from both racial discrimination and ageism.

This seminar focuses on the ethnic dimensions of ageing in the UK, and seeks to introduce new ideas and practices to cope with ageing issues. The speakers are: **Professor Michael Keith** (University of Oxford), who will discuss migration and ageing; **Professor Chris Phillipson** (University of Manchester), who will discuss research into ageing and ethnicity; **Dr. Siew-Peng Lee** (Brunel University), who will discuss the experiences of elderly Chinese in the UK; and **Professor Itsuko Toyama (Kanamoto)** (St. Andrew's University) and **Atsuko Takenaka** (The Japan Association in the UK) who together will discuss the findings of a recent quantitative survey on elderly Japanese living in the UK.
